#### **Highlights of the May Board Meeting**

Emerging from the pandemic-induced isolation brings about a spirit of new beginnings, and an intensified desire to tackle new challenges.

The highlight of our May Board Meeting was a vote to approve the conversion of Kavanaugh Park from an underutilized playground to a permanent dog park. We've discussed this project for several months, and we appreciate the helpful feedback we've received from residents. Construction will begin right away, and the anticipated time frame for completion is two months. Special thanks to our Master Planning Committee for their contributions with research and design.

In keeping with the animal theme, the Board discussed another regular item of concern. The overpopulation of feral cats in many areas throughout the Ranch has become increasingly problematic. Unfortunately, this problem is made worse when residents provide food to these feral colonies. Though well-intentioned, this attracts more cats who breed rapidly. Without adequate shelter and care, these cats often lead short and difficult lives. We urge everyone not to feed the feral cats.

The best way to reduce and manage our population of feral cats is through a trap, neuter and release - or "TNR" program. We're thankful that several of our residents have volunteered to participate in these efforts. The Animal Defense League of Arizona (ADLA) provides resources and support. The Association is working with the ADLA to provide financial assistance to Dobson Ranch Residents who follow the ADLA program. If you'd like more information, please reach out to our Executive Director Lynelle Glysson.

May's Board Meeting also included the appointment of Board Officers. It's my sincere honor to serve as Board President for another year. It's definitely been an adventure!

Congratulations to our newly elected Board Officers: Vice President Nicole Lynam, Secretary Ben Smith, and Treasurer Stephanie Fee. Together, along with the rest of the Board, we're committed to looking ahead and making Dobson Ranch "The Best Place to Live."

#### **Board Decisions Keep Us Moving Forward**

At May's Board of Directors Meeting there were several important decisions made. The Board approved an update to our Common Area Guidelines. Included in the updates are such benign things as changing the name of the architectural committee to the Dobson Ranch Architectural Committee, moving the FOB guidelines from the appendix to the body of the guidelines and updated restrictions on debris in the lakes. All forms were removed from the auidelines and will be available separately. This allows for any minor changes to operations to be revised without having to update the guidelines. Dog Park Guidelines were added for our new dog park that is underway. Approved by the Board is a Boat Trailer Rental Agreement. For those who have boats, you can now rent the Association's boat trailer. There are some restrictions, but this can make it convenient to boat owners who need to put their boat in or take their boat out of the lakes.

The Board also approved getting accounting service proposals from third-party accounting companies. Dobson Ranch has been a self-managed Association for nearly 50 years and has always employed a Finance Manager to manage the accounting, financial reporting and other accounting tasks. In the last few years, it has become more difficult to employ staff within the Dobson Ranch budget as the competition for these types of employees has risen in the greater Phoenix/Mesa area. Some of the benefits of having a third-party accounting company may be cost savings, separation of duties and a wider knowledge base that a third party can bring. These are serious considerations that the Board will take under advisement. Most importantly, no matter what the Board decides, you will receive the same personalized service that makes Dobson Ranch so special.

#### **Water Awareness**

#### **Final Report**

I started posting articles in the *Ranchers' Roundup* in 2008 and it has been a good run. Though I

never made it to 800 words, I did generate articles that regularly filled half a page. I cannot really say I wrote those articles as I mostly paraphrased what was being discussed by those with far more knowledge on water conservation. I had a good time, but now I must move on to other endeavors.

Water conservation is far more important than I originally imagined. When I came to this amazing place, I succumbed to the notion there was plenty of water. There was the Salt River and tubing was fun. Our neighborhoods were still green and there were the boys of spring to enjoy. That first summer was a shock, brutal even. After six years, I had learned a lot about Arizona and the Valley of the Sun and became comfortable enough to begin writing about our relationship with our water resources and the need for conservation.

Those who have gone before, from the ancient ones to the travelers, the migrants and to our neighbors; they all played a role in building the Salt River canals, preserving the Tonto Basin and building the dams along the Salt River. As much as it may

seem like a river, the Salt River is just a tributary of the Gila River; itself a tributary of the great Colorado River. It is our collective responsibility to carry on the husbandry of these rivers for future generations.

One of the major undertakings on my watch has been the introduction of innovative irrigation controllers. Through the efforts of the Salt River Project with its smart controller program, we have introduced stand-alone smart controllers in many of the homes in Dobson Ranch and most of our common areas. The common area controllers are now on a cloud-based system with the savings over the past decade exceeding \$500,000 on the water not purchased.

The past two decades have proved to be times of change. We were all part of that change. And there is more to come as we figure out how to live with a changing climate. I trust I created a water conservation tradition for Dobson Ranch. I have enjoyed this journey in the desert and will always remember water is abundant to those who use water wisely.

We certainly will miss Craig's insightful water conservation articles in Ranchers' RoundUp and wish him the best in his future endeavors.


"Congrats to all the staff involved. Keep up the good work!


#### NANCY ROGGIO Employee of the Month May 2021



### DESERT LANDSCAPING TIPS & TRICKS

#### **Getting Ready for Summer**

Wicked summer heat is just about here. Now's the time to get your plants ready for it. Remember to deep water trees, cactus, succulents and other plants once a month during the hot months. Yes, even cactus.

Plan how to give your plants supplementary shade in the coming months, especially for plants that get full afternoon sun. Have shade cloth on hand and some type of clips to secure it. Clothes pins (found at the dollar store) or clamps work great. Use them on the shade cloth, not on your plant as it can cut off the nutrients to that part of the plant. If clamped on an arm, that arm could die.

Shade cloth comes in different percentages. Thirty percent blocks out 30% of the sun, etc. Use 30, 40 or 50% shade cloth on plants depending on how much shade the plant needs. Shade cloth sold at *Lowe's* or *Home Depot* is very dense, usually 80-90%, and great for your patio, but not your plants, as it will block out too much sun and not let your plant photosynthesize correctly. *Summer Winds Nursery* has 50% on hand.

Shade cloth comes in knitted or woven cloth. I find that the woven type is less likely to catch on plants or me, blends in better, and, to my eye, looks better in the garden. The knitted cloth does seems to drape more easily, so it depends on how you want to use it.

If you grow *Echinocereus grusonii* (golden barrels), do plan to put on some shade cloth on the top, south and west side. So many of these plants died last summer as they couldn't take the really extreme temperatures. I had two layers of shade cloth on mine and they lived.

It took me several decades trying to remember which plant got which piece of shade cloth as it came out of my plastic storage bin. It finally occurred to me to put a label, attached with a clothespin, on the sunscreen when I took it off and stored it for winter. Makes it all so much easier the next year.

## To Bee or Not to Bee?

Last month's Conservation Corner discussed a Citizen Science Project using the "Zombee Hunting Kit" available through our Mesa Public Library. Library card holders are able to check out the kit and contribute to research right in their own backyards. The project helps scientists determine if a bee parasite causing hives to die off in California is here in Arizona.

Here is some food for thought the next time you enjoy a salad, a piece of apple pie, or a slice of watermelon:

Saving bees is vital because bees are considered the most important pollinators of plants.

Need a refresher on pollination? Think back to high school science; in a nutshell, pollination is the transfer of pollen from one part of a plant to a different part of the plant. Or, if you prefer technical terms, as a pollinator, a bee carries, or moves, the pollen grains from the anther of one flower to the receptive part of the carpel or pistil of another.

The relationship between pollinator and plant is considered one of the most ecologically important animal-plant interactions. Without pollinators, many plants could not set seed and reproduce. And, without plants to provide pollen, nectar, etc., other animal populations would decline.

There are over 4,300 native bee species in North America and Hawaii. Research by the **Center for Biological Diversity** (*BiologicalDiversity.org*) concluded that bees play a crucial ecological role by pollinating wild plants and provide more than \$3 billion in fruit-pollination services each year to crops in the United States. Due to threats such as habitat loss and pesticide use, 700 species are in trouble. Over 40% of America's honey bee colonies collapsed in 2019.

The Sonoran Desert is home to about 1,000 species of native bees. According to Water Use It Wisely (WaterUseItWisely.com) our native bees co-evolved with our desert plants for eons and they now "work" together in terms of food gathering and pollination services. The Desert Botanical Garden (dbg.org) considers native bees "The

Unsung Heroes of the Desert." Our native bees range in size from less than 1/16" long (the world's smallest!) to as long as 1-1/2".

It is fairly easy to tell native bees apart from honey bees. Most native bees hold their legs close to their bodies while flying and honey bees' legs dangle below their bodies. There's no need to be afraid, most of the native bees you'll encounter do not sting. Honey bees aren't aggressive when collecting food for the hive. (But, as Winnie-the-Pooh has shown us time after time, it's best not disturb the hive of the honey bee.)

Planting a pollinator garden or adding pollinator plants is a great contribution. The newest columnist to the *RoundUp*, **Sue Hakala**, will be sharing about pollinator gardens in a future article in "Desert Landscaping Tips & Tricks."

Choosing organic foods at the grocery store is an important choice, because the pesticides used in non-organic farming are lethal to pollinating bees. Or, write to Congress and urge the end of the use of bee-toxic pesticides, or neonics, the leading cause in the collapse of bee colonies (nrdc.org/savebees).

Feel like a party? Attend the Pollinator Power Party, the world's largest virtual party

celebrating pollinators, June 21-26, 2021. Last year over 1.2 million people joined in the celebration of pollinators and the role that electric power companies have in protecting them. The party is in conjunction with **National Pollinator Week** and includes fun activities such as a celebrity cooking class, pollinator art and culture, habitat management stories, scientific lectures and gardening tips. Learn more about this family-friendly event and register at *Pollinator.org*.

So, the next time you take a sip of coffee, savor a prickly pear margarita, or enjoy the sights of flowering plants while taking a stroll through our beautiful desert, are you now going to thank the bees? That should no longer bee a question.

The Board of Adjustments meets once a month and is tasked with hearing and deciding on variances, special use permits, and interpretations of the City of Mesa Zoning Ordinance. The decisions aren't always easy, but it does feel good when we are able to help residents facing a unique problem with their home, business or property.

## Q: Tell us about your role as a member of the Dobson Ranch Architectural Committee.

NL: I was appointed to the Dobson Ranch Architectural Committee (DRAC) in June 2019. The DRAC meets twice a month to review applications for visible alterations of properties within the Dobson Ranch community and helps to ensure that our community is held to a consistent standard. Our big accomplishment since I have served on DRAC has been updating the Architectural Guidelines. Our Committee members and HOA Staff put a lot of effort into researching our various CC&R Documents, City of Mesa Ordinances, current laws, and similar neighborhood standards, to bring our Architectural Guidelines to current compliance. We successfully held multiple open workshops for resident feedback. During the process, we found a lot of community support for the updated documents, which we hope will help maintain the quality and value of our neighborhood for many years.

## Q: What challenges are you looking forward to tackling on the Board of Directors and why?

NL: I think our biggest challenge is that we are an older community. Over the past 48 years, our community has developed its own character and identity. As we continue into the future, we need to ensure that we are able to keep that unique history and identity, maintain or improve quality, update amenities, bring in new advancements, and keep our community to a high standard where people want to live. That is a big task and determining the best path to achieve it requires a team of collaboration that I think our current Board of Directors and Committees are qualified to tackle. I'm looking forward to being more involved in that process.



## At Our Lakes

## Our Ranch Waterways

With summer here and the prospects of a monsoon or two in the near future, it is important that we consider why our lakes at the Ranch were designed. Our lakes are technically labeled as "water shed runoffs." In simple terms, they are designed to absorb storm runoff in the event of heavy rainfall. Hopefully, we see some of this elusive heavy rainfall this year!

Dobson Ranch is built on... you guessed it... an old ranch. Ranches have some characteristics of being flat covered by dirt and vegetation. When heavy rain falls on a typical ranch, it gets absorbed into the fertile ground pretty well, not so much when it comes to concrete and asphalt. All the water which would have normally been absorbed into the ground needs to go somewhere, and that somewhere is our lakes.


Our lakes water level is maintained by the SRP canal. For those of you who are not aware, SRP stands for "Salt River Project." The Salt River has been diverted and placed into canals over the years to help feed our ever-growing city. The original Salt River once fed the original land that Dobson Ranch is built on and that is why our lakes are able to be maintained by the SRP

canal. The land has rights to the water because of its history. It is incredibly more complicated than this, but, in a nutshell, this is why we are able to have lakes rather than drainage basins.

Since our lakes also act as drainage basins, everything... and I mean **everything...** ends up in them. Nearly all of the storm drains in Dobson Ranch feed directly or indirectly into the lakes. There is also a 3-foot elevation change from Lake 1 to Lake 8, with Lake 8 being at the lowest level. In the event of a 20-year or 100-year storm, there is a valve at Lake 8 which will release water back into the SRP canal. There is also a runoff and retention area designed into Carriage Lane Park, which is located just south of Guadalupe Road.

Since anything and everything has the opportunity to end up in our lakes from either rain, wind or gravity, it is important for us to be mindful of what ends up in our gutters. Sprinklers should be adjusted to limit runoff. Pools and other bodies of water should be drained to the sewer clean out of the home, not into the street. Yard debris should be cleaned up and properly disposed. Trees that overhang any of the lakes should be regularly trimmed.

If we all do our part, we can help maintain our lake system for years to come.

#### Tennis Tip for June: Beating the Heat

#### **Beating the Heat**

As we are heading into the hotter season of triple digit temperature, we now need to alter

our playing time to beat the heat by either playing in the early morning or after the sun goes down. Listen to your body and give yourself more rest time during court change. You may want to shorten your point playing by coming up toward the net to attack and end the point sooner.

And, to help shorten your game duration, you may want to use the no-ad (no advantage) scoring method.

Because we are sweating more when the temperture rises, it is important to maintain proper hydration before, during and after the match. Though water is the best beverage for sport, a carbohydrate-electrolyte beverage can help boost sodium levels in extreme weather. Whatever you do – do not drink caffeinated beverages before or during play!

Another beneficial practice for hot weather tennis is acclimating ourselves to the weather before we play. This can help reduce the impact that the hot weather conditions have on our bodies and, by extension, on our game.

Remember, even when the heat feels unbearable, precautionary steps and proper hydration can make all the difference in ensuring that we stay in peak form on the court.

Nonthe Sanchez plans to attend Mesa Community College to study psychology. She hopes to become a psychologist and help teenagers overcome mental health issues.



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


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
