
Monthly Update from Councilmember Heredia


Did you know? Most projects in Mesa go through the Planning & Zoning Process. Generally, this process involves a pre-submittal,

formal submittal, citizen participation, and follow-up submittal. All submittals require a citizen participation plan, which must state how the applicant will engage surrounding property owners and residents in review of the development request. This part of the process is crucial because it gives our residents the opportunity to learn about and comment on the proposal. The Danger of Dead Trees

With monsoon season in full swing, dead trees in front and back yards can become a dangerous hazard. Tree care, which can include the removal of dead trees, is important for the safety of residents and

their properties. Storms and strong winds can be very destructive to trees

with heavy leaf cover and thick crowns.
Severe weather can cause a healthy tree with a fully leafed-out crown to uproot and fall over. Weak or dead branches can be lethal when falling to the ground. Early detection and treatment is often much more cost effective than ignoring the

issue until it's a big problem. Please refer to the **Residential Architectural Guidelines**, Section 2.17 Trees regarding heights and trimming.

SECTION 2.17 TREES

No trees, shrubs or planting of any kind on a Lot shall be allowed to overhang or otherwise to encroach upon any bicycle path, sidewalk, or any other pedestrian way or any other property in the Dobson Association, including another Lot, from ground level to a height of 8 feet

or overhang or encroach upon any public right-of-way or street from ground level to a height of 14 feet.

Dead tree stumps must either be cut below ground level or the stump be "ground" so as not to be visible

from the street. Trees, shrubs or plantings must be maintained with significant dead foliage/limbs removed. All palm trees must be trimmed on a regular basis to remove any dead or brown fronds from palm trees in front yards and rear yards. Trees and shrubs shall be trimmed 8' above lakes. In addition, please consult the declaration for your particular

subdivision to determine whether more restrictive provisions or additional restrictions may apply.

Well cared for trees, are a valuable and important asset to the community. Trees improve the overall quality of life and enjoyment for residents. Remember to look in the *Ranchers' RoundUp* for landscaping and tree trimming vendors. DESERT LANDSCAPING TIPS & TRICKS

Cochineal on Cactus

What's that white cottony stuff on my prickly pear cactus? *Dactylopius* coccus, cochineal, is related to aphids, scale and mealy bugs. They live on prickly pear cactus and chollas as a parasite. The bug lives under a white, sticky, fluffy-looking layer that looks like cotton candy, that is secreted by the female around her body. She hides herself behind it as she sucks out the nutrients and juices of the plant. If left on your plant, they will spread very quickly and will kill your plant.

The carminic acid in her body fluids provides a dye so powerful, that it will color anything it touches with flaming red. In Mexico and Peru, the bugs are harvested by hand, dried, then pounded into a fine powder. It takes about 70,000 female bodies to make one pound of dried powder. The powder is used in cosmetics, fruit drinks, candy, popsicles, artificial crab, sausage, catsup, and more. When first discovered by European explorers, it was used to dye the red coats of British soldiers and royalty.

When you find cochineal on your cactus, likely others in your neighborhood have it too. It can often plow through a neighborhood destroying all the prickly pear cactus and chollas it encounters. The bugs are spread on the feet of birds.

The most effective way to deal with cochineal is to duct tape an old toothbrush to a long stick. Then rub the cochineal until you see red, which means you've squished it and it's dead.

You will need to repeat in about 7 days, and again in 14 days, to kill the new hatchlings and egg cases. Be sure to get in the pads where they join the plant as this is a favorite hiding place. You will know that you have been successful in killing them when the white stuff looks gray. Squeeze or poke the fuzz, and if there is no red, they are all dead. Just wash the dead bugs off with a blast from the hose.

Movers and Shakers

Innovative Ideas Save Thousands

Marc Diaz, our Facilities Manager, has been an asset to the Dobson Ranch Facilities Department for more than four years in total and has been recently awarded the Employee of the Month Award for July 2021. He has been integral to the overall improvement in the common areas maintenance standards on the Ranch. Find out more about him and his innovative ideas that are saving thousands in this Q&A-style interview.

Q: What is your educational and work background?

MD: JR College – Certificate of Completion in Microsoft Office Levels 1 & 2, Trade School – Certificate of Completion in Residential and Commercial Electrical Wiring, Heating and Cooling, Mechanical Maintenance, Boiler Operator Course Work, and Pool Operator Course Work.

Q: What is your family status?

MD: I have been married to my beautiful wife Shaunda for 19

years. We have two wonderful boys, Easton - 6, an Elias - 8. (Marc and his family reside in Mesa.)

Q: How long have you worked for Dobson Ranch?

MD: I was originally employed at Dobson Ranch from 2016 to late 2018, and then returned in May of 2020.

Q: What do you most enjoy about working for Dobson Ranch?

MD: I especially love the ability to work outside and move about the property.

Q: Tell us how you lead by example.

pools this year?

MD: I believe leading by example is demonstrating the willingness to tackle any task at hand. Also helping when needed regardless of workload.

Q: Tell us about your experience with large semi-public pools. A: My pool maintenance journey began sometime around 2012

while working for Four Seasons at Troon North. Q: What is causing the extreme shortage of chlorine tablets for

MD: The chlorine shortage has been a mixture of supply and demand. A fire at a chemical plant and a pandemic-driven boom in the construction of backyard pools is forcing end users to supplement with liquid chlorine. Plus, COVID-19 kept more families at home in 2020, allowing them time to utilize their pools more so than in previous years. Panic buying of chlorine tabs could make the situation even worse.

Q: Explain how you introduced an automated chlorine and

acid feeder system, along with bulk chlorine storage tanks for our four Dobson Ranch pools.

MD: While employed here during late 2016, I noticed pools were difficult to properly maintain due to lack of automation. With the understanding that most, if not all, continually used, large bodies of water utilized automation; I approached management with implementing controllers. After consideration, controllers were installed on each body of water. Results were positive, and residents continue to notice a significant improvement in water quality.

Q: How do automated acid and liquid chlorine feeders work in simple terminology?

MD: An automatic pool chlorinator plugs directly into your pump and filter system and sanitizes the water returning to the pool. Rather than placing the chlorine directly in the pool in a floating chlorinator, for example, an automatic chlorinator dispenses liquid chlorine steadily from outside the pool. Both systems are long lasting and energy-efficient.

Q: Approximately how much money has Dobson Ranch HOA saved this year by using the automated chlorine and acid feeder system in our pools? MD: Cost savings are hard to calculate, but the main advantage of automation would be to constantly administer pH adjustments and disinfectants continually. Pool automation greatly reduces the need for pool closures due to poor water chemistry. (According to Dennis Melgreen, our Facilities Director, it is estimated that this system will save thousands of dollars per year.)

Q: Tell us how you are learning to master the art of balancing lake



MD: Balancing lake levels has become a constant teacher. I need to understand what the weather will do 3 to 5 days out, sometimes it should rain, other times not. My challenge is understanding the length of time needed to fill and/or empty the lakes enough to account for any changes in the weather.

Q: What is the single most important thing that you have learned from Craig Wilson regarding balancing lake levels?

MD: That it is most important to anticipate storm water runoff.

Q: What other challenges are you looking forward to tackling in Dobson Ranch and why?

MD: I am looking forward to future property improvements and streamlining our maintenance programs.

Q: What do you enjoy doing in your spare time?

A: I enjoy skateboarding, playing airsoft with my kids, and assisting my wife with home improvements.





Learn to Live Green

Practicing a sustainable lifestyle or 'living green' is an increasingly important focus for many individuals. What I find is that the majority of our community members want to do the right thing – not just for themselves but for all

However, to successfully protect and conserve our environment and natural resources, we must integrate actions from the whole community. Solutions must be integrated from the government level, from our businesses, and, of course, through actions taken by individual citizens.



Climate Action Plan:

Some exciting news to share is that in June, Mesa formed its first Climate Action Plan! This Mayor

and Council priority initiative will help establish policy to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, build resilience in our community, and address the negative outcomes of climate change. The initial plan addresses city operations and will focus on energy, air quality, heat mitigation, water stewardship, materials management, and food systems.

The Plan is a living document that will evolve over time as new strategies and resource technologies come to light. Next steps will be to work with community members to gather viewpoints and priorities of all Mesa stakeholders in preparation for a community-wide plan. Watch for dates from mid-September to November for surveys and community engagement opportunities offered both in-person and virtual. In fact, Councilmember Heredia will present on the Parks Master Planning and this topic on Thursday, September 23 from 6:00 - 7:30 pm at Dobson Library. Learn more at mesaaz.gov/ClimateAction.

Turn garbage into gold by composting your kitchen scraps and landscape clippings. The City of Mesa has backyard compost containers available for a \$5.00 non-refundable delivery fee. Call customer service to order yours at 480-644-2221.



Do your doody! Picking up pet waste is more important than you might think. Bacteria, nitrogen and other components in dog waste are a major contributor to stormwater pollution that can end up in our canals, parks and community lakes. Yuck! Remember, only rain in the storm drain!



Plant some shade and be kind to the trees you have. When we take care of our trees, they take care of us by cleaning the air, and providing oxygen and cooling shade for our homes, sidewalks and cities. SRP offers a shade tree program and will give participants two free trees. Visit bit.ly/SRP-SHADE.



Take back your meds! Mesa offers MedReturn boxes at four police stations. Never flush prescription or non-prescription drugs down the toilet where they can contaminate water supplies. Other items that are too toxic to trash, like old gardening or automobile fluids, electronics, paints, and more can be taken to our Household

Hazardous Materials facility. Learn more at *mesarecy-cles.org*.






