City Breakfast Recap, Project Updates and Volunteers Needed

The 43rd Dobson Ranch Annual City Breakfast was held on April 27th. This is a meeting in which the City of Mesa reports on areas of interest to the Board of Directors. We have a great relationship with the City of Mesa's staff, Council and Mayor Giles. They have been making strides in developing programs that address the needs of the community. One such program is their Housing Path to Recovery. This program offers a path from homelessness into stable housing and ultimately independence. If you want to learn more about this program, please visit: www.azmag.gov. Another program that benefits the community is the Mesa College Promise. This is a commitment from the City of Mesa that all Mesa high school graduates can attend Mesa Community College for two years with tuition and fees fully funded. By the time you read this, the final draft of the **Residential Architectural Guidelines** will be available on our website, in the office or you can request a copy be emailed to you. The Guidelines will be voted on by the Dobson Ranch Architectural Committee (DRAC) on May 24, 2022, at 6:30 pm at La Casita. These will not be enforced until July in order to give everyone a chance to familiarize themselves with the changes. There are minor changes including: a new standard wall color of Bungalow Beige; string light guidelines; updated flag guidelines to adhere to the new laws; clarification on play structures; and an appendix that clarifies setbacks, hardscapes and a list of desert-adapted plants and trees.

I wanted to give you updates on some of our projects. The remodel of the Saratoga Rec. Center is still in process. We have had to keep the pool closed longer than expected due to demolition. It will be open when it is safe to do so. You will start to see work being done in Laguna Park as we install the new pole lights and bollard lights. Next, we will start installing bollard lights along the Lake 7 walking path. They will extend all the way to the end of Lake 7 at Keating. Work at the La Casita pool is largely done. This was work on the mechanism that keeps the pool running such as the chlorinator, pumps, filters, and electrical work. We will hold off on work on the La Casita splash pad until after summer, so that it can be enjoyed during our hottest season.

Staff would like to hold a **Kids Fishing Derby** event in October on Lake 1. We will provide the fishing rods, fish to catch, and, most importantly, volunteers. This is where I need YOU. I would like 10 volunteers to assist with this event. Please contact me directly at: Iglysson@dobsonranch.com or call the office at: 480-831-8314. I need to have volunteers with a general knowledge of fishing and being able to handle fish identified by June. This event can only take place if we have enough volunteers to help. I know we have a huge community of fishing enthusiasts who would like to see the love of fishing passed on to the next generation.



My husband Josh and I have lived in Dobson Ranch for six years. We have a daughter, Ella (7), and son, Emmett (5). Our children's favorite way to beat the heat is through water play! Below details our favorite spots.

Splash Pads:



La Casita Splash Pad

The La Casita Splash Pad and pool here in Dobson Ranch is the place we frequent the most. The splash pad and park are shaded, and the kids love going from the pool to the splash pad. Because it is only for HOA members, it is never crowded, and I have met some awesome parents there!

However, for those of you with kiddos who are not swimmers, be careful to keep a watchful eye on your littles, as the splash pad is not fenced in from the pool, and little ones are easily tempted/distracted by the bigger kids swimming. While splash pads are ideal for little ones, it can also be stressful for parents to keep them away from the Junior Olympic-sized pool, so keep that in mind!

If you are looking for a local splash pad with no pool to tempt your preschooler, I recommend the following public parks: Kiwanis; Desert Breeze; Espee; Pioneer and Mesa Riverview. Each park has their own unique water features and shaded play areas. However, since they are public parks, they tend to get pretty crowded - especially on weekends. Another

fun option for splash pads is Tempe Marketplace or Chandler Fashion Mall, where you can also grab a sweet treat nearby. Tempe Marketplace even does a fun "Summer Splash" event every Thursday in June with music, games and photo ops with lots of fun characters.

Aquatic Centers:



Desert Oasis Aquatic Center

Our favorite aquatic center is Desert Oasis, near Alma School and Elliott. It has water tables, raindrops and a kiddie pool with a small water slide for younger kids. There is also a 112-foot water slide and a deep water drop slide for the bigger kids, in addition to the

8-lane pool. Entry is only \$1 for kids and \$2 for adults.

Similarly, Chandler also has Mesquite Groves, Hamilton, and Nozomi at the same price. Each of these aquatic centers offers different water slide options, interactive water play, and even lazy rivers and a water vortex, depending on which one you choose!

The Mesa Flowrider Surf Machine at Rhodes Aquatic Complex is also a fun option in our neighborhood. In addition to the Flowrider experience, there's a splash pad with tumble buckets and a huge diving pool.

Lastly, the recently resurfaced Kiwanis

Wave Pool is a fun alternative to traditional pools. Like the Chandler aquatic centers, both Rhodes and Kiwanis are public facilities that charge only small fees for entry, there are also lifeguards on duty at each facility.

Water Parks:

If you're looking to spend more money for a more thrilling experience, there are some great water parks in the area. Dobson Ranch offers discounted tickets to Golfland Sunsplash,

our closest water park and family fun center. Six Flags Hurricane Harbor is Arizona's largest water park with an abundance of thrill rides for all ages.

The Great Wolf Lodge in Scottsdale offers both day passes and overnight experiences with a spectacular indoor water park, indoor adventure course, bowling alley, rock climbing and more.

Resorts:

There are SO many great resorts here in Maricopa County. We've taken the kids to the JW Marriot, Westin Kierland, Fairmont Scottsdale Princess, and AZ Grand Resort. You can book a room for the night and plan a "staycation" with two days access to the resort. Weekday options are always less expensive and great deals can be found on Groupon. The website Resortpass.com details resorts with



DESERT LANDSCAPING TIPS & TRICKS

Aloe Vera

Most people know the plant aloe vera, Aloe barbadensis. It can take a lot of abuse in terms of growing conditions, and is handy to have around for burns. Many a cook has snapped off a leaf and rubbed the slimy juice on a burn or blister to prevent blisters from forming as it promotes skin cell growth. Don't be in a rush to use just any aloe on your skin, as some can be quite caustic and damaging to the skin. It is best to know what you are using before you use it.

Through the ages people have used the aloe vera plant for healing purposes, some more successfully than others. Western medicine has studied the use of aloe vera in treating wounds, ringworm, skin allergies, abscesses, fungal infections, dermatitis, lacerations, inflamed cysts, etc. A physician in the Chicago Burn Center demonstrated in the 1980s that aloe treatment eliminated scarring, aided the return of normal skin color, and amazingly regenerated hair follicles in a burned skin area -- all very important uses for burn patients.

This kind of publicity has given aloe vera an elevated status as a health remedy. Some promote aloe vera as a treatment for a wide variety of ailments beyond its use as a help for burns. In doing research for this article on the Internet, I found hundreds of sites championing the use of aloe vera internally and externally for almost anything. Most claims are unsubstantiated and unproven. Desert Botanical Garden cautions that consumers should be wary of claims on the Internet and elsewhere stating ingesting aloe can help arthritic swelling, reduce blood sugar in diabetics, and work wonders on a variety of aliments. It simply is not true.

Most aloes can't take full sun exposure here and certainly not aloe veras, preferring some filtered afternoon shade. Most also don't care for cold nights, needing some cover, or to be brought indoors for the night. Keep these requirements in mind when placing a plant, provide slow deep watering after drying out the soil, and a little rose food fertilizer in late fall, and you'll be rewarded with a winter flowering plant, and help with a burn. That is if you can bear to snap a leaf off.

Report to the Annual Meeting of the Members

Every year the HOA here at Dobson Ranch meets to have its Annual Meeting of the Members. This year's meeting took place on April 12th and was finally back to an "in person" format. During the meeting each committee reports on what has happened over the last year and what some of the plans are for the future.

If you were unable to attend, here is a recap of the Water and Lake Management Committee's report. The Water and Lake Management Committee is committed to maintaining our water resources and lakes here at Dobson Ranch. Plans for this year are to continue to follow our Lake Management Plan and to improve on it and its implementation where possible. The lake Management Plan is an action plan created by the committee and approved by the Board for the Staff to use to address lake issues as they happen.

Our Reverse Irrigation Plan saved over two million gallons of water last year, the Smart Irrigation Controllers which monitor soil moisture content also save significant amounts of water due to their ability to make adjustments to the watering schedules after rain fall.

Last year several installations of artificial underwater habitats were placed in Lake 1, additional habitats were placed in

Lakes 7 and 8 early this year and there are plans for more habitats to be placed throughout our lake system this year and in years to come.

The Committee and Staff have developed a "Lake Tracking" spreadsheet which puts lake data and any significant event pertaining to our lakes in a usable form. We have also begun to use a drone service two or three times per year to get an overhead visual assessment of the lakes which can be compared season to season and year to year.

We are continuing to monitor Lake 8, and are looking into solutions to help better the lakes overall health and aesthetics. Lake stockings, monitoring, testing and dye treatments will continue as last year with slight adjustments determined by current lake conditions and needs. Overall, our lakes and fish population are healthy with two of the three lakes tested last month falling into the "Excellent" category (Lakes 1 and 3) for urban lakes, with the other lake falling into the "Good" category (Lake 2).

The Water and Lake Management Committee meets the second Monday of each month at La Casita.



Mesa Rhodes Junior High Builds Pathways to Success

Rhodes Junior High School is passionate about student success, and the community's hard work and dedication is showing. After two historically challenging years, students and staff are persevering and making gains.

Under the leadership of **Patty Christie**, former principal at Rhodes Junior High School, and **Joan Wilson**, interim principal, they worked to develop and support a rich learning environment. Rhodes is known for having a teaming educational model, a successful learning platform management system called *Summit* and partnerships with local colleges, universities and the community.

Embracing the future

Christie is moving to another role in the district and shares that she is proud of the Rhodes staff for helping students through a difficult time and is excited for Wilson to continue the work they started.

"Joan is the right person to take Rhodes to the next step as the interim principal," Christie says. "She knows all of the ins and outs of what we are doing and things we wish to accomplish moving forward."

Building pathways and relationships to the future

To enhance classroom learning, Rhodes uses *Summit* as their learning platform. Students can access a range of helpful resources that provide a deeper learning experience. Parents and families have access to their student's progress and can see everything from teacher feedback and assessments to grades, and are encouraged to actively support their students.

Wilson shares Rhode's relationship with the Mary Lou Fulton Teachers College at Arizona State University and Next Education Workforce is a win-win. It paves the way for student teachers to work on campus while providing an extra layer of support for students and staff. This positive relationship affords student-teacher internships where they receive hands-on experience, support and job placement opportunities.

"This program allows us to grow our own," Wilson shares.
"Student teachers come to us right out of college and can't imagine working anywhere else because of our highly collaborative environment and close-knit community within our school."

Rhodes partners with Mesa Community College so students beginning in an education pathway can be on campus at Rhodes. The learning experiences make interns excited about teaching as a career. Wilson shares that in the fall MCC interns will provide a *Full STEAM Ahead* project at Rhodes providing equitable and engaging experiences for its students. Grand Canyon State University assists Rhode's math department with an additional layer of support by offering students remote math tutoring.

Building stronger relationships with the community adds to the inclusive nature and positive culture at Rhodes.

"We are committed to building stronger relationships with our community," Christie says. "Whether engaging with Mesa PD, Fire and Medical and SWAT Tactical, or showcasing our Pawsitive Peers therapy four-legged faculty members, working together makes us stronger and benefits our students."

Tennis Tip for May

What is a Foot Fault?


During tennis play, one may or may not know that they are doing the following:

- touching the ball ever so slightly and not letting your opponent's know;
- during close net play you accidentally made contact with the net or reached over the net during ball contact;
- and lastly, the most common unconscious performance is the server creating a "foot fault" where the server's foot is touching the court during the serving motion.

All players stand close to the baseline when serving, but we are not looking at our feet because our head is looking up to strike the ball over our head. Many players will tend to "foot fault" due to chasing a ball toss that's slightly too far in front, or standing close to the baseline and serving hard, which will put your body in motion and propel you forward into the court.

So, one must make the adjustment of standing a tad further back to prevent this matter from happening. On the receiving side, both players can warn the server of displaying a foot fault. The server should not display anger or disproval when being warned, but simply acknowledge the warning, make the adjustment and be aware of your action, so "life can go on".
