Board of Directors' Meeting Report - January 26th Summary of Board Action Items and Motions

2023-01-100 - A motion was unanimously carried to approve a 60-day moratorium on Reserve Projects.

2023-01-101 - A motion was unanimously carried to appoint to the Board of Directors Randy Harvey and Christa Tropin for the remainder of the terms ending April 2025.

2023-01-102 - A motion was unanimously carried to approve the purchase of an Umbrella License from the Motion Picture Licensing Corporation. Funds will be appropriated from the Operating Account in the amount of \$2,289.00 annually. This license will allow the Recreation department to show unlimited movies.

2023-01-103 - A motion was unanimously carried to approve the purchase of RecDesk Recreation Management Software. Funds will be appropriated from the Operating Account in the amount of \$6,800.00 annually.

2023-01-104 - A motion was unanimously carried to approve the buyout authorization for the Quadient Mail Machine Lease Agreement from 2018. Funds will be appropriated from the Operating Account not to exceed \$2,400.00.

2023-01-105 - A motion was unanimously carried to appoint Stephanie Fee, Nicole Lynam and Kathleen Tolar to the Ad-Hoc CC&R Committee regarding Amendment and Reinstatement of the CC&Rs.

2023-01-106 - A motion was unanimously carried to approve the discontinuation of the Spring/Summer/Fall Camp Programs at Dobson Ranch upon the recommendation of legal counsel.

The next Board Meeting will be held on March 23, 2023 at 7:00 pm at La Casita.

Fiber Optic Update

You might have already seen activity in the Ranch! Fiber Optic installation has begun in West Mesa; some areas of Dobson Ranch have already seen crews working diligently getting fiber optic installed. As a reminder, last year, the Mesa City Council unanimously approved license agreements with AT&T, Google Fiber, SiFi, Ubiquity, and Wyyerd, allowing for more high-speed internet options to bridge the digital divide.

The agreements outline the process for the new providers to install their fiber optic network facilities within the City's rights of way and it allows them to begin the permitting process. Many companies have already begun the work and we are excited!


Ubiquity is currently handling installations in some areas within Dobson Ranch. Providers will notify residents and businesses located in the areas that might be impacted by construction, typically with a letter, postcard or doorhanger. Keep an eye out for some of these items.

I bring my organizational skills, attention to detail, and a friendly personality to our Code Compliance team. I'm so excited to be part of this community and helping to make it an even better place to live.



DESERT LANDSCAPING TIPS & TRICKS

SAGUARO

A saguaro (Carnegia gigantea) doesn't live where freezing temperatures continue during the day and with less than two inches of rain. A saguaro can reach 60 feet in height and have as many as 50 arms, if it is lucky to live long enough in the rough desert conditions. They don't flower until they are about 40-70 years old.

When they flower, the pollen and nectar are eaten by bats, insects and doves, pollinating the plant. Each flower can have 2,000 seeds in one red, pulpy fruit loved by doves, rodents, javelinas, coyotes, and you. The fruit is 70% carbohydrates, 30% fat and 10% protein. Native people have harvested and eaten the fruits for centuries. A saguaro can produce up to 40 million seeds in its lifetime, needing just one to live to carry on the genes.

The seeds need just the right about of summer rain to sprout and well spaced seasonal rains for up to three years to establish themselves. They also need a 'nurse plant' to shield them from the blazing sun, frost and high desert winds. An ironwood, palo verde or mesquite tree works, and maybe a bush too thanks to birds who eat the seeds and then poop them out. Saguaros often outlive their nurse plants.

How fast do they grow?

In the right conditions: at 20 years about 1 foot, by 40 years 4 feet, at about 70 it might start to grow arms, and if lucky, live to be about 200 years old—this depends on good growing conditions.

I had a bird deposit a seed right next to my front sidewalk. Thanks to extra rain from the garage roof and afternoon shade, it grew to about 15" high in about 10 years. We transplanted it into the front yard, providing 50% shade cloth for the first few summers. It has taken off beautifully since then. In summers when I don't get much rain, I give it a good soak once a month in June and July, then nothing at all for the rest of the year. It needs nothing else.

You can tell when your plant needs water as the 'pleats' in the epidermis get close together. When the plant has filled its tissues with moisture, the trunk swells and the pleats get further apart. It's fun to use a measuring tape to track the circumference of the trunk before the monsoon season and then after, to see how the plant has expanded.

RIGHT PLANT, RIGHT PLACE PROTECT YOUR LANDSCAPE INVESTMENT

Right Plant, Right Place... We can't say it enough. Who is making the decision to plant the wrong plant for the site, or shall we say the 'right plant,' just in the wrong place? Here are a few considerations to discuss with your landscape professional before planting:

Mature size: Is there enough space for the plant to grow, both in width, height and below ground? Or will it need excessive pruning to fit the space? Check plant resources like the Western Garden book or local resources like the AMWUA website (www.amwua.org) which lists mature sizes for many of our low-water use plants. Always research your plant before planting.

Growth habit: Does it grow tall and upright or have a sprawling growth characteristic? Will you be forced to shear one side of the to get it to 'fit' into the space? Just because it appears upright when you buy it doesn't mean it will continue to grow in this manner.

Environmental factors influence the ultimate size of a plant: Watering more than necessary leads to fast, weak growth and increases the need to prune to fit the space. Exposure may also cause a plant to grow abnormally: a sun-loving plant growing in the shade may reach towards the sun, affecting its size and shape. This often creates a lopsided shrub if planted too close to a structure or wall.

Varieties & cultivars: Watch for plant varieties (naturally occurring plant variations) and cultivars (nursery-bred or hybridized) with unique characteristics. When buying plants, know the cultivar's growth habit and ultimate size. Example: you want Tecoma x 'Sierra Apricot,' a shrub which grows 3-4 feet tall and 4-5 feet wide, but mistakenly purchase yellow bells (Tecoma stans). The ultimate size of the latter can reach up to 20 feet tall and about 15 feet wide if not cut back annually. This is a significant size difference in two plants with similar names.

The right plant in the wrong place can become a maintenance nightmare. It requires the landscape maintenance company to prune plants to fit into the allotted space. This becomes problematic for shrubs, reducing bloom and even plant vigor. Plus, the plant will demand more water when in a constant state of stress due to excessive pruning, which doesn't help the water conservation efforts in our state. A knowledgeable landscape professional will help determine the best plants for the space, exposure and microclimate.

Conserving Water is Stylish in Dobson Ranch

I received a call last week from Best Friends Preschool located at 2038 S. Don Carlos. The preschool now has a large green bin near the front entrance for donations of clothing, shoes and linens. GreenTek, the company behind the bin, accepts materials in any condition, even damaged. If you have clothes that didn't sell at the Spring Clean Up or are piling up in the back of your closet, this bin

makes it convenient for you to donate your items, just like the Goodwill at 2039 W. Guadalupe Road. Thank you, Best Friends, for the new addition to the neighborhood!

How is clothing paired to conservation? According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), the average person throws away 70 pounds of clothing per year. The EPA estimates that 95% of the clothes, shoes and linens that are thrown into the garbage annually could be reused or recycled. If that doesn't knock your socks off, up to 20% of industrial water pollution is due to textile dyeing and treatment.

To think about clothing and water in a different fashion, consider cotton. The U.S. Department of Agriculture states that one bale of cotton, approximately 480 pounds of cleaned cotton lint, makes more than 200 pairs of jeans or 1,200 t-shirts. The average irrigation requirement for cotton is approximately 260,000 gallons per acre. From start to finish, the water needed to produce a single cotton t-shirt is over 700 gallons.

Pinal County farmers received about 87% less water in direct allotments in 2022 than the year before due to a multi-state Drought Contingency Plan. Are more changes coming to one of Arizona five C's due to drought? Some positive changes are the development of less thirsty cotton strains as well as more efficient watering techniques.

As farmers are being innovative with new technologies in growing cotton, consumers can make changes in our clothing choices. Sew don't get your knickers in a knot, make clothing choices in favor of water conservation; donate, shop resale, and support businesses that are transparent and have initiatives in favor of conservation. For example, 100% of the denim sold at low-cost clothing giant Old Navy is made with water-saving techniques.

In keeping with the same pattern of water conservation, this year the Dobson Ranch Spring Expo will be held on Earth Day, Saturday, April 22, 8:00 am - 11:00 am.

Aquatic Consulting and Testing Reports

Aquatic Consulting and Testing has performed monthly Water and Lake Management Inspections for our lakes in Dobson Ranch for many years. You may not be aware that a monthly report is available on the Dobson Ranch website for you to review under the menu pulldowns Amenities > Our Lakes (dobsonranchhoa.com/our-lakes).

These reports summarize data collected under the revised program initiated in 2019 that includes comprehensive testing of the lakes on a monthly basis and bi-weekly field inspections twice per month throughout the year. Field sheets for the inspections are also included in each report to include laboratory reports, and pesticide application documents, when applicable. Additionally, as in the case of the January 2023 report, special E. coli and total phosphorus data are presented for Lake 8.

Each monthly report gives detailed data for each lake. For example, see the following information pulled from the report for Lake 7:

Lake 7

Lake temperature ranged from 13.3 to 13.9 C (56-57 F). Water pH ranged from 8.6 to 8.7 SU, indicating moderate algae density. Dissolved oxygen ranged from 10.7 to 11.8 mg/L and was more than satisfactory for the fishery. Fish activity appeared normal. Transparency was about one meter, with turbidity of 4.2 - 4.8 NTU. Fountains were in operation.

Waterfowl density was about one bird per acre ($\sim 1/A$); excellent according to the Arizona Game & Fish Department rating system. No cormorants were noted. Adult Midge Flies did not appear to produce any nuisance issues to lakeside residents or visitors.

The dominant suspended algae in the lake were again problematic blue-green forms; colonies of Microcystis and Merismopedia. Density of algae was elevated. The dominant algae make the water turbid and produced surface scum. No golden algae were identified in the lake.

We would like to extend a welcome to Zach Hache, Biologist, with Aquatic Consulting and Testing! Zach is the new Water Resource Manager on staff at Dobson Ranch and working closely with the Water and Lake Management Committee.



Tickets range from \$20 to \$10 kidsclub@dbacks.com - depending on seats and stadium. Personally, our family loves the lawn seats! Visit cactusleague.com for the 2023 spring training schedule.

D1 College Games - Both Grand Canyon University and Arizona State University have fantastic D1 baseball programs, ASU's stadium is located near the Phoenix Zoo, and general admission is only \$10/ticket. GCU's stadium is a bit farther on their campus in the heart of Phoenix, however, general admission is only \$5/ticket and includes a tailgate with rides and games for children - as well as free food! Both teams are nationally ranked and are favored for their division tournaments. The PAC 12 tournament will be held at Scottsdale Stadium and the Western Athletic Conference tournament at Hohokam stadium. So, don't worry if you miss spring training in March – you will have the opportunity to catch a game (at a cheaper price!) at a local spring training facility later this spring. Visit the gculopes.com and thesundevils.com for schedules.

Arizona Diamondbacks - Opening day for the D-backs is March 27th. If you have not taken your kiddo to a game yet, I highly recommend it! Located on the upper concourse of Chase Field is the Sandlot, with pitching practice, a playground, batting cage, a toddler area and the Kids Club headquarters, where you get swag and rewards for being a member of the free D-backs Kids Club.
