

Message from the Executive Director

During this Historic 50th Anniversary, it is an honor to serve as the Executive Director of The Dobson Association. As I think about the Ranch's impact on the residents, staff members, public servants, and businesses throughout the last 50 years, I can't help but think of the influence all leaders that came before me had on the Dobson Ranch family and entire community.

As the community association management industry evolved, we all shared common goals to build and sustain a community that people want to call home by preserving the nature and character of the Ranch, providing services and amenities to residents, maintaining, and protecting property

values, collecting assessments, enforcing rules & regulations, and meeting the expectations of our homeowner members.

Planned communities began in the mid-20th century based on homeowner members sharing common area utilities, services, and amenity costs. Amazingly, Dobson Ranch pioneered the industry as the first and largest master-planned community in Mesa, AZ. Dobson Ranch was developed and managed by Continental Homes from

1973 - 1981 with Charles Kinney serving a portion of that time as the Executive Director. Continental Homes adopted governing documents on October 23, 1973 that outlined how the community was to operate moving forward with shared homeowner responsibilities.

In 1978, management transitioned to the nine-member homeowner Board of Directors, elected by homeowners. Remarkably, over the next 28 years, a local community representative held the position of Executive Director to provide quality leadership and sincere guidance, beginning with Dale Douglas from 1982 through 2000. Then, once Dale completed his time as Executive Director, other Executive Directors came on board through the following years to manage the Association. Those Directors and years included:





getting their mail. I have never seen such a unique community as Dobson Ranch, and I am happy to work here and listen to all the wonderful stories from long-time residents and new.



From Desert to "The Best Place to Live": A History of Dobson Ranch

NOTE: This history has been compiled as part of the 50th anniversary of Dobson Ranch. Sources of information include interviews with various residents and local officials, City of Mesa annexation and zoning records, and a wide variety of various newspaper articles. Special thanks are due to the staff of the Mesa Room of the Main Mesa Library for access to invaluable historical records. Any errors in this narrative are certainly unintended and are the responsibility of the author, Frank Mizner.

The Early Years - The Dobson Family

The roots of Dobson Ranch began in Perth, Ontario, Canada. Wilson Wesley Dobson left Canada in 1886 and homesteaded 160 acres of raw desert land near Alma School and Baseline roads. He was followed by his brothers John and George. The original Dobson home was at the corner of Center and First Street in downtown Mesa.

It was John who ran the family operations. He acquired additional land for an eventual total of nearly 4,000 acres. He was active in politics and was an early officer of the **Salt River Project**, which brought irrigation water from Roosevelt Dam to much of the Valley. Agricultural businesses included the **Baseline Cattle Company** and the **Sheepspring Sheep Company**. Crops included alfalfa and cotton.

A son of John, Cliff Dobson, was joined by a brother-in-law, Dwight Patterson, to greatly expand operations in the 1950's. This expansion included a large cattle feedlot and other ranches throughout Arizona.

The Dobson family was very prescient in seeing urban growth approaching the East Valley, including the regional freeway network. 160 acres were sold at the corner of Dobson and Southern for development of Mesa Community College. In 1970, Desert Samaritan Hospital was built on 24 acres donated by Cliff. The Patterson family home was on Dobson Road and was later incorporated into the golf course facility; today it is the restaurant after extensive modifications.

Also in 1970 Dobson and Patterson sold most of their remaining 3,000 acres to Continental Homes at an average cost of \$6,000 per acre.



Mesa Growth

Mesa was founded in 1878 by Mormon pioneers from Utah. It was named "Mesa" which is Spanish for a tableland, often above a river - in this case the Salt River. At that time, the Salt River was free-flowing and supplied irrigation through a series of canals originally developed by the Hohokam native population.

Development was largely limited to the original square mile (University-Broadway-Country Club-Mesa Drive). The railroad came to Mesa in the early 1900's, and growth greatly accelerated after WWII.

By 1988, Dobson Ranch was completely built out with the last homes constructed in the Brookedge neighborhood north of Laguna Park. Today the Ranch has 5,000 residential units, about 1/3 single-family homes and 2/3 a combination of condominiums, townhouses, and patio homes.

The Father of Arizona Spring Training

Dwight Patterson was instrumental in encouraging major league baseball teams to conduct their spring training in Arizona. In the 1950's most teams did so in Florida and other locations. By the 1970's there were several teams based in the Valley. In 1979 Mr. Patterson opened the Dobson Ranch Inn at the northwest corner of Isabella and Dobson. It was the first quality resort hotel in Mesa.

Amenities included executive suites, an oversized pool and meeting rooms. The original restaurant was Dale Anderson's **The Other Place**, and the **Charro Lounge** featured live music and nightly dancing. For many years the Milwaukee Brewers and later the Chicago Cubs booked rooms for their minor league players.

For his long-term efforts, Mr. Patterson was known as The Father of Spring Training Baseball in Arizona, and was inducted into the Spring Training Hall of Fame.

The Dobson Ranch Inn was demolished in 2021 and redeveloped as a high-end apartment project named Broadstone Dobson Ranch.

Dobson Ranch Development

Annexation of the Dobson agricultural holdings into Mesa was necessary in order to provide utility services. That took place in 1972. In 1973 the overall master plan was approved by the City Council and development began immediately in the Los Altos area.

In 1973, Jim Petrie was the Mesa City Manager and Eldon Codley was the Mayor. Officials with Continental Homes included Charles Keating, Carl Lindner, and Gem Pennington.

Dobson Ranch was seen as a real coup and very positive for Mesa. We had never seen anything like it. The groundbreaking ceremony was at the bottom of the then-dry Lake 1 and featured many local big-wigs. Dobson Ranch was not then part of Mesa and required annexation for utility services. It was just that, a "ranch". The Dobsons were very far-sighted in seeing the freeway and urban development coming their way. They donated or sold land where Banner Desert Hospital, Mesa Community College, and Fiesta Mall now stand.

The US-60 was initially planned as a "parkway" with limited access. Mesa insisted on a below-grade freeway with 1/2 mile crossings (e.g. Longmore and Extension). The freeway was extended to Country Club in 1983, and the 101 freeway was developed in the mid-90s. There were some controversies along the way. Residents were very opposed to the City radio tower on the MCC campus, and to a proposed high-rise where T.C. Eggington stands.

Dobson Ranch has always had a good relationship with the City as evidenced by the annual Breakfast with the City of Mesa meeting. Innovative programs (e.g. bike lanes, recycling barrels, speed humps) were first tried on the Ranch with HOA cooperation and then expanded City-wide. Sales on Dobson Ranch were always strong despite the uniqueness of its HOA. Interestingly, the area south of Guadalupe, with a separate builder, advertised itself as "the sizzle of Dobson Ranch without the cost".

Finally, I'd like to mention the long-time positive influence of **Dennis Kavanaugh**, who served nearly 20 years on the Mesa City Council. Dennis represented Dobson Ranch very well and was always a reasonable voice for all residents.

There were many unique features in Dobson Ranch, primarily the lakes and the street system. Mesa had no similar developments, and Dobson Ranch was seen as an excellent asset for the entire southeast Valley. Other unique features included zero-lot line homes, common area landscaping, extensive recreational amenities, and even the concept of an HOA to maintain common areas and facilities.

Several school sites were dedicated to the Mesa Unified School District, and construction soon followed. B.T. Washington Elementary opened in 1974, Rhodes Junior High in 1978, Crisman Elementary in 1980, and Dobson High in 1982. Numerous sites were also either dedicated or sold to provide for a variety of churches within the community.

Sales began in 1973 in the Los Altos area. The US 60 freeway was not yet built and there was some concern about the perceived "isolation" of the area, as well as the uniqueness of the development. Homes were relatively small, many without garages, but sales were brisk and construction proceeded east and south.

NOTE: Jack Magura was Sales Manager for Continental Homes from 1975-1980. He had previously worked for the Mission Viejo Co., developer of The Lakes in Tempe.

Jack was hired by Charles Keating, then President of Continental Homes, which at that time was the largest homebuilder in the Valley. Continental was a subsidiary of American Financial (AF) out of Cincinnati. Carl Lindner was the President of AF. He worked closely with Charlie Kenny, the Continental employee who managed the Dobson Ranch property prior to homeowner control.

Homes started selling in the Los Altos area originally at \$30K. Lee Trevino was part of the groundbreaking ceremony for the golf course. Dobson Ranch had many unique features which certainly helped sales. These included the lake system, the golf course, and the many recreational facilities. Originally, the plan was to have bridges over the lakes on Baseline, Dobson, Lindner, etc., but that proved to be too expensive.

The legal structure of The Dobson Association is for one master governing document with eleven sub-associations, each with their own board of directors, assessments and architectural controls. This unique legal structure was intended to accommodate individual characteristics, such as private streets and condominium ownership, but has led to some confusion and controversy due to the overlapping assessments and CC&R provisions.

Initially The Dobson Association was managed by an employee of Continental Homes and residents had little influence on various issues. Once sufficient homes were sold, management was turned over to the homeowners, who in turn hired an on-site manager.

Our Original Executive Director

NOTE: Dale Douglas was the first Executive Director of Dobson Ranch hired by Dobson Ranch residents. Dale has served with the Tempe Police Department for 20 years, retiring as a Captain.

Dale started working with the Dobson Association on December 7, 1981. He had four employees working out of a former construction trailer on the current La Casita site. John Freeman was the Board President. Board meetings were in the afternoon at John's home. Dale was with the Association for 20 years, until 2001. There were some significant issues that Dale worked on during his 20 years serving the HOA including:

- A proposed high-rise building on the southwest corner of Alma School and US 60 that caused major homeowner opposition.
- The large City communications tower on the MCC campus that residents also opposed.
- A Board donation of \$5,000 to the Mesa Symphony that caused Board turmoil.
- Negotiations with the State to obtain permanent status for the lakes.

Dale summarized, "Service with the Dobson Association was very rewarding. I am most proud of managing a smooth transition to homeowner control, of establishing and maintaining good relations with the City, and of development of the current La Casita facilities."

The Future

What will Dobson Ranch be like in another 50 years? Forecasting the future is notoriously difficult, but here are some possibilities that I see happening:

- More retail and office developments will convert to high-density residential.
- The Ranch's convenient location will encourage updates and home add-ons.
- Drought will accelerate lawns will disappear, private pools will become cost-prohibitive, and there will be political pressure on our lakes.
- More young families will move into the Ranch to avoid long commutes.

This article and other items will be part of the 50 year time capsule so we will see how it goes!

Conclusion

Researching and writing this article has been very interesting and a lot of fun. Thanks to all my sources, to the members of the **50th Anniversary Committee**, and especially to **Skye Riss**, Dobson Ranch's Communications Manager!

Most of all, thanks to the residents of Dobson Ranch for continuing to make this "The Best Place to Live". I have lived here since 1987 and I've always been proud to say that I live in Dobson Ranch.

Dobson Ranch is unique among larger HOA's in being "self-managed". That is, residents elect a Board of Directors who in turn hire an Executive Director who is responsible for hiring staff and overseeing day-to-day operations on the Ranch. Most HOA's utilize management companies who provide necessary staff for maintenance, landscaping, CC&R enforcement, accounting, etc.

This self-managed concept of Dobson Ranch has always been highly appreciated by our residents and has contributed to the feeling that Dobson Ranch is a unique and valued community within the larger fabric of Mesa.

Dobson Ranch Size

Along with the City's golf course, library, fire station and police substation, Dobson Ranch has many of the attributes of a stand-alone community; indeed the Ranch is larger in population than such Arizona cities as Douglas, Payson, Coolidge, Paradise Valley, Camp Verde, and Show Low.



Milestones of Ranchers' Round

Within the Dobson Ranch archives, we have ALL of the original Ranchers' RoundUps to date starting from the very first issue in September of 1976 and thank goodness because we were able to write this article by flipping through all of them to jot down pages of notes which include a goldmine of milestones of how the HOA transformed over these 50 years. Carolyn Burleson, our Administrative Assistant and I had a blast reading all the original stories and seeing the advertisements, especially the ones from the 70s and the 80s! Let's just say that the headlines and copy were not as "filtered" as they would be today, and they gave us a good laugh!

That being said, here is a full timeline of how Ranchers' RoundUp has transformed over the years, as well as the historical milestones the HOA had accomplished. This covers the highlights! Please enjoy!!

- September 1976 The 1st edition of RoundUp was titled the Dobson Rancher and the editor was Sherri Lee Brooks. It was a black and white, double-sided newspaper.
- October 1976 Volume two was released and went to a four-page newspaper format. A Welcome Newcomers article was added to feature new
 residents in Dobson Ranch, and most of the newspaper content was about recreational events.
- . Sovember 1976 The name Ranchers' RoundUp was born thanks to the Stevens who won a trip to Vegas!
- December 1976 The two main forms of communication were the telephone and Ranchers' RoundUp which was manually placed in resident's
 mailboxes. Display ads started showing up as well.
- Sanuary 1977 The Recreation Department were the ones who originally worked on putting together the RoundUp. There was an article asking volunteers to help write articles in the newspaper about fishing tips, sailing techniques, gardening hints, houseplant care and more. The first Chef's Choice featured recipe was Lemon Meringue Pie from resident Debbie Pettit.
- February 1977 New article headlines included Advisory News, Around & About, Focus (which is now Movers and Shakers), Newcomer's Corral
 and the story of the Dobson Ranch logo!
- March 1977 The first Homeowners Annual Meeting was announced to Dobson Ranch residents and it was hosted at Washington Elementary School on Tuesday, March 8th.
- October 1977 Continental Homes reports the construction of the La Casita Recreation Center starting.
- March 1978 Recreation Center for DR opens!
- October 1978 Dobson Ranch Grows and Grows with details about growth of Superstition Freeway and Laguna Shores.
- December 1980 The magazine's logo changes and the full calendar of events started showing up on the back page. RoundUps in the 1980's also advocated for political candidates.
- October 1881 Tennis lesson schedules started appearing with class schedules.
- May 1983 Dobson Ranch celebrates its 10th birthday. Celebrations included a sack race, a balloon toss, snow cones, face painting and bounce
 houses. The event started at 10:00 am in Laguna Park. All the food was \$0.10 each per item!
- July 1983 Fitness articles started popping up.
- September 1984 A Table of Contents was added to the newspaper.
- 1985 9ssues There used to be opinion pieces published such as, How Serious is Your Drinking?, What To do About Back Pain, and
 The Healthier Me, just to name a few.
- 1986 9ssues "The Ranchers' RoundUp Now Has A New Centerfold, and It's Quite A Looker".

- June 1987 The Dobson Ranch Library opened to the public.
- December 1989 The Ranchers' RoundUp logo changed again and the magazine was 20 pages. The Los Altos Recreation Center opened. There was a special new section called Kids Corner which would feature student's accomplishments from each local school including Booker T. Washington, Alma Elementary School, Dobson High School and Rhodes Junior High School.
- May 1989 Children submit written entries for Mother of the Year.
- June 1989 Children submit written entries for Father of the Year.
- October 1991 La Casita groundbreaking was held on October 1st.
- May 1992 The Junior Olympic sized Pool opened at Los Altos. There was a dedication of the new La Casita Community Center held on May 9th.
 Residents, board members, dignitaries attended.
- June 1994 A new logo for Dobson Ranch is featured as part of the Ranch's Renewal Project.
- · December 1997 The Green Thumb Awards started.
- June 1998 The newly remodeled Saratoga Recreation Center was reopened. June 23rd was when the Memorial Rose Garden was completed.
- . September 1998 The new Dobson Ranch pontoon boat was named Dobson Dinghy and launched for the dedication of the new dock at Los Altos.
- . November 1998 The cover finally had fully colored photos on the front.
- Sune 2007 Names were given to each lake for easier identification. Lake 1 Los Altos Lake, Lake 2 Frisbee Park Lake, Lake 3 Macayo's Lake, Lake 4 Memorial Lake, Lake 5 Dover Lake, Lake 6 City Park Lake, Lake 7 Saratoga Lake, and Lake 8 McBrien Lake.
- September 2009 The La Casita Recreation Center has a grand reopening after the pool reconstruction.
- Spril 2011 The tennis courts at Los Altos were converted to pickleball courts.
- January 2012 The Dobson Ranch Memorial Rose Garden was awarded the 2012 Public Gardens Excellence Award.
- September 2017 Keyless entry FOBs replaced regular keys to the amenities located throughout Dobson Ranch.
- May 2019 Sunset Plaza outside of La Casita was dedicated.

Since Dobson Ranch was founded in 1973, The Dobson Ranch Recreation department has grown exponentially with more classes, improved free activities, and a larger-than-life staff. Once the first magazine was published in 1976, all information regarding recreation classes and events was featured and still is to this day. Residents can find classes such as tennis, swimming, and dance lessons for both adults and children, which all have been prevalent since our doors opened. Some classes that were taught in the early years of Dobson Ranch that are no longer available include boxing, flag football, and even weightlifting. As Dobson Ranch expanded, the classes became larger for more residents to enjoy.


Before our recreation center was transferred over to La Casita in 1979, Dobson Ranch was already hosting numerous activities and events in our original locations of Saratoga and Los Altos. One of the original events that used to be held here at Dobson Ranch was an old-fashioned picnic starting the year we were first founded.

This picnic included arts and crafts vendors from residents, a baking contest including cookies, cakes, pies, and a pet show where families could feature their beloved furry friends. Although the picnic is no longer an event we organize, our Fall Festival, is a refined version of it. The Fall Festival is one of the four largest events we hold for our community which includes beer tasting, music, dancing, and games for young kids. Attendance over the years has increased due to more families moving into the community.

As Dobson Ranch grew, The Dobson Ranch Association has grown with it but not only the facilities, the amazing staff that runs the show as well. For our 50th anniversary, the splash pad located at La Casita got a long overdue facelift that opened just in time for summer. Our Saratoga location, that dates to 1973, is currently being renovated and we anticipate the grand opening of it soon. You might be surprised to know that only six full-time staff run our administration side and only five full-time staff run the recreation side. For as large as Dobson Ranch is, being roughly the same size as the city of Payson, AZ, the work that is being completed by these few staff members more than make up for their small numbers.

At the front desk on the Recreation side, you will find Jackie Allen, who works hard to accommodate guests in need. Along with Jackie, Jessi Feltmann (Ms. Jessi), our preschool teacher for the last 18 years, puts her heart and soul into teaching the young children of this Association. Next is our Recreation & Lifestyle Manager, Amanda Jensen, who works tirelessly to ensure operations and events run smoothly and favorably with the help of ourselves Niya Begay and Hannah Roberts! On the Administration side, Fran Pawlak, our Executive Director, is constantly working in favor of the residents, using her expertise to lead this community forward. Johnathan Lefler in Code Compliance helps residents attend to their property. Ronnika Giles and Carolyn Burleson, our Administrative Receptionists provide excellent customer service. Camille Gonzales, our Operations Manager, unites the Admin, Recreation and Maintenance teams in our office and has implemented numerous systems essential for everyday operations. Our Accounting Clerk, Akina Trimmer, works diligently on assuring our finances are maintained. Marc Diaz, our Facilities Supervisor does an amazing job with keeping our amenities beautiful. And last but not least, our Communications Manager, Skye Riss, who does so much more than creates the beautiful Ranchers' RoundUp's each month, but also connects with homeowners and business partners alike to strengthen our relationship within the community.

The Dobson Ranch Associations goal is to make our community the premiere choice to live, and our staff members and the community's progress upholds that ideology. Because of the perseverance of all our departments, Dobson Ranch can celebrate another year of "The Best Place to Live!".



A Dobson Franddaughter With a Big Heart

Meet Ann Patterson Cleghorn, the daughter of Dwight Patterson (1912 - 1999) and Ruby Mae Dobson Patterson (1915-2003). Ruby was born on Dobson Ranch. Ann was also very close with her grandparents John Dobson (1845-1921) and Sarah Electra Scott (1881-1965) and remembers such wonderful memories of working and playing with her family and cousins on the Dobson cattle ranch. Now living in Gilbert, AZ, she takes us back to the time to the mid-40s and 50s when Mesa was a quiet town with dirt roads and open land as far as the eye could see.

Ann was born at Saint Joseph Hospital in Phoenix in 1938. Both of Ann's parents were well known in Mesa, for sitting on various organizations and forming Dobson Ranch as we know it today.

Ann's father Dwight Patterson was honored as a history maker in 1993, as a Rancher, and the "Father" of Arizona Baseball Spring Training for forming the famous **Cactus League**. Dwight also founded the **Hohokams** in 1953, an organization made up of volunteers who helped the Cubs and the Oakland Athletics during baseball games with parking, collecting game tickets and more. Ann joined the Hohokams in 2000 as a volunteer and all the proceeds went to charity.

Dwight was trained as a teacher and served as a trustee for all three branches of public education in Arizona. Dwight was born in Tempe to pioneers who homesteaded the area in 1880. He married Ruby Mae Dobson in 1936 and the couple moved to Mesa. Dwight became associated with the Baseline Cattle Company and the Sheepspring Sheep Company and was active in the Arizona Wool Growers Association and the Cattle Feeders Association.

Ann remembers Mesa at a time when it wasn't the bustling city we know it as today. "I grew up on the Ranch at Baseline and Alma School when it was a dirt road south of Baseline. I used to meet my cousins on Saturdays and Sundays in our Ford tractors, and we drove through the countryside. Also, we would travel to the Northeast and the East Coast around the time when Dad brought the Chicago Cubs to Mesa in 1953, and we used to travel with the Cubs! We'd go to Chicago and New York City," Ann reminisced.

Both of Ann's parents would have fun parties at their home on the Ranch and invited famous people like **Joe DiMaggio** and **Mr. William Wrigley**, founder of Wrigley's Gum. Aside from all the fun Ann had, she also worked on the Dobson cattle ranch. "I was a seamstress during the summertime, and I would weigh the molasses feed trucks for the cattle."

The entrepreneurial mindset and large family inspired Ann's life. Ann has been married to her husband Richard for 18 years and Ann has three daughters and five grandchildren. During her career, Ann worked as a Managing Partner at the Dobson Ranch Inn, founded by her father Dwight and other partners. The Dobson Ranch Inn, in its heyday, was the place to meet for business and to stay for a night out. The Inn was also the official meeting place of the **Cactus League Baseball Team** and the spring home for the Cubs and the Milwaukee Brewers during various times in its 30-year lifespan. "I was a partner after Dad passed, and I moved into his office," Ann remembered.

In memory of her father and his love of baseball, Ann founded the **Dwight Patterson Youth Sports Scholarship**. The purpose of this scholarship is to provide financial assistance to students in the Masters in Athletic Training programs that have demonstrated a commitment to youth sports and the well-being of youth athletes through their academic, clinical, and service activities. Recently, Ann donated money to the **Arizona School of Health Sciences** in honor of her father.

After reminiscing about her memories with her family and Dobson Ranch, Ann shared with us her celebratory message for our 50th Anniversary.

"I think congratulations are in order. It is incredible that there are over 5,000 homes there now. People really seem to love living in Dobson Ranch. Mom and Dad were thrilled that they got to live there as well. Congratulations to all of you for an extremely successful and well-run community!"

Jim and I purchased our home at 2420 W. Via Rialto Avenue in 1973 for \$43,000. This included additional fees for lakefront property and a sunken living room.

We, and our two children, enjoyed watching our home being constructed and moved from our Tempe home in March of 1974.

I-60 ended at McClintock, and the 101 was just under construction. So, Price Road was the north/south route in the area.

There was no water in Lake 1 at that time, nor were there any grade schools in the area. Our children were bussed to Ida Redbird and Whittier until Brooker T. Washington Elementary School was built. Our oldest was bussed to Powell Jr. High, before Rhodes was built. He also attended Mesa High School, and decided to stay there after Dobson High opened. Quite an interesting beginning!

We won the contest to name the first community newspaper... Ranchers' RoundUp, and won a \$200 paid weekend in Las Vegas. The newspaper eventually went to a magazine format, but it's fun to know that it has kept the same name.

Los Altos tennis courts and swimming pools came into being, and the first Recreation center was there, with one employee in the office.

Entrances to the bike path were fenced and gated, and homeowners had to use their key to enter both ends. Annual picnics began at Los Altos with food and games like sack races, etc. My husband won the first sailing regatta there. We later sold our sailboat for a row boat, and then purchased a pontoon boat.

The first HOA assessment fee was \$9.50. It's amazing now, considering all the homes, lakes, recreation areas, etc. on the Ranch, that our current fee is only \$50.72!

I served on the Recreation Committee for several years, and was captain of a tennis team that played league competition at La Casita many seasons. It's been great seeing all the changes in the past 50 years, with a variety of family activities, well maintained pools, tennis and pickleball courts, plus a large retirees group that stays busy. My husband passed away in 2014; but I've chosen to remain in my home. As far as I know, there is only one other original owner still residing on my street. In addition to all the many positive things, the entire HOA staff and Board of Directors continues being friendly and doing an incredible job for our community, proving that Dobson Ranch truly is... "The Best Place to Live!"







Michele Terry moved to Dobson Ranch in 1974. It was the summer just before starting 8th grade. She attended Powell Junior High School for 8th and 9th grade with other kids from the Ranch. There weren't many children who lived on the Ranch those first couple of years, but eventually Michele had plenty of good friends. Michele and the other children on the Ranch went off to attend Mesa High School, as Booker T. Washington, Rhodes Junior High School and Dobson High School were not built at the time. Dobson High School was built last on the Ranch.

One of the first jobs Michele had as a teenager was being a Receptionist at the La Casita Administration Office. Michele handed out fishing licenses, took tennis court reservations and assigned bike tags. Michele said, "It was a good first office job!"

Michele remembered a lot of fun moments during her childhood on the Ranch. "When I lived on the Ranch, there wasn't a pool, basketball or tennis courts, so my friends and I went swimming in the Los Altos lake. It was a big deal when the Circle K was built on Baseline, because we rode our bikes there during the summer for cold slushies and treats. We had a basketball hoop in our driveway and there were always kids playing ball in our yard or in the cul de sac," Michele reminisced.

The biggest change that Michele got to experience was the building of the US 60 highway. "My brother and his friends rode their bikes up and down the mounds of dirt and into the deep trenches that were dug, and my brother would come home covered in dirt! I also remember learning to drive in the parking lot that eventually became the Fiesta Mall. It was fun having a mall so close! Watching Dobson Ranch expand over the years was amazing," Michele fondly remembered.

"As the Ranch grew and more families joined the neighborhood, the pools, tennis courts and basketball courts were built. Things became more

We would build plywood forts and sand piles and had dirt clod fights. I got hit with a dirt ball and was in great pain. So, I climbed inside the fort and laid there, and I heard dirt clods hitting the walls. It was like a warzone," Frank laughed! "When my brother and I went to Booker T Washington Elementary, they came up with the mascot idea of the Booker T Bulldogs, because someone would bring their Bulldog into work, and it became a regular occurrence, and all the kids loved it!" Frank shared an interesting story about a special drainage river near the elementary school. "That drainage river would come all the way down to the 60 and so many toads spawned in it and there would be hundreds covering the grassy school field. So as kids, we collected hundreds of little toads in cups and showed them to each other, and then something else was built in its place and the toads stopped showing up. But when I moved back to Dobson Ranch in 1997, one night I found a toad in my garden."

In his free time, Frank enjoys riding his pontoon boat on the lakes in Dobson Ranch and watching all the wildlife. He often sees beautiful Owls and Blue Herons. For work, Frank works at the **American Legion**, which is a private club for Veterans and their families. "I work as a bartender, but I am also a member because my grandfather fought and served in World War II. I can't vote on anything, but as a bartender, I sure have a lot of leverage! I have made many amazing friends over the years of working there."

In 1978, Carolyn worked part-time at the Saratoga pool, because at that time, La Casita was not built yet. "We wore navy blue shorts with a round yellow D for Dobson with the circle around it because that was the logo back then. I was the one who opened the gates for residents to get in and out of the pool and I would clean the pool by brushing it down."

Eventually, Carolyn learned about the need for people to help deliver Ranchers' RoundUp to

the homes, so Carolyn got together with her family, and they started delivering the community newspaper! "At the time, my children were ages 12, 10, and 6 and we used to pick up the papers once a month on a Friday at Los Altos. We folded them, put them in bags, and then delivered them the next day. We only had one day to deliver them, and my children were paid a nickel. My daughter Lisa used to deliver them on roller skates and a red wagon, which someone stole, Frank David used to deliver them on bike and by foot. And Kari would just be the little six-year-old helping her older siblings. We did this for quite a few months and in total we delivered the newspapers to about 1,500 homes in Dobson Ranch."

Carolyn and her family have always been very active within the community. Her son helped teach tennis, her daughters were both on the Dobson Dolphins swim team, Carolyn was one of the first pickleball players who got the club started, eventually became Treasurer of the Retirees' Club and has worked in that position for over 12 years!

Aside from participating in many Dobson Ranch clubs and activities, Carolyn has also worked at the Scottsdale Center for the Arts as their sead House Manager. "I'm the one that opens the doors to the theater, and I've been with the Center for 31 years. 




Original Marker Drawing of De

Real Estate History in Dobson Ranch

My first glimpse of Dobson Ranch was when we approached our new home at 2313 S. Playa Cir in Saratoga Lakes. The date is still firm in my mind. January 29th, 1979. I was a junior in high school and my father had just accepted a job transfer to AZ. He would be a District Manager for Alpha Beta Markets and his home store would be the one on Dobson and Baseline. The local Albertsons store resides in that plaza now. Dobson High had not been built yet, so my twin sister and I would finish our high school years at Mesa High. Our house backed up to what would eventually become Laguna Park. But for now, my younger brother and I would enjoy the empty lot right behind our house. We had fun riding our bikes over the dirt mounds, shooting our BB guns at tin cans, and watching the jackrabbits scurry about.

I have had the privilege of seeing many, many changes in the area and right here in The Ranch over the last 44 years. I vividly remember the street post sign on eastbound Baseline road near the Tempe border. It was one of those City signs welcoming the driver to Mesa while posting the current population. It read 154,000. A year or two later, it read 160,000. Then 182,000. The sign is no longer there. Mesa's population is now about 515,000.

I have come to truly appreciate the variety and character of the many residences in Dobson Ranch. Among the 20+ subdivisions, you'll find condos, townhouses, patio homes, and plenty of single-family-detached residences. There are several subdivisions that I mark as favorites in my mind.

Laguna Shores has the distinction of boasting some of the Ranch's highest resale prices. Most of the houses there have generous lot sizes and many of them have 3-car garages. There are plenty of waterfront lots and a huge variety of exterior styles, such as Tudor, Spanish, Ranch, and Territorial. A house in Laguna Shores recently sold for \$900,000! That's the current record sales price in Dobson Ranch.

Brook Edge Estates is one of our newest subdivisions, built between 1984 and 1990. I love the tile roofs and Spanish-style look. The reason for the late start is that the land was once penciled in for an elementary school. Eventually, it was decided that the kids south of Receive and was of Deban south attended.



that the kids south of Baseline and west of Dobson could attend the existing Booker T. Washington Elementary north of Baseline road.

Knoell Villa Solano is among our most unique subdivisions. This is because the homes there are what are known as the Gemini Twin style. This dwelling type is fairly rare. From the street, it looks like a duplex, but it's not. A Gemini Twin home is two separate parcels owned by separate individuals. If you look closely, sometimes you can see an old roof woven next to a new roof. This happens when the two owners choose not to get new roofs simultaneously. The homes in Knoell Villa Solano sell quickly when they hit the market because they are highly desirable.

I've also admired **The Landings** community. These are the townhouses that are lined up string-style just south of Baseline and west of Dobson. They all have garages and most of them back up to a very peaceful and narrow lake that resembles a stream. The community features two pools and some rock water features. I love taking my morning walk through there. Of course there are several other beautiful subdivisions that are worth noting including **Legante Paseo**, **Westport Bay** and **Lake Park Village**.

I've had the privilege of enjoying a front-seat view of the real estate market swings over the past few decades. The Ranch has weathered all the market fluctuations and remains to be a popular destination to call home. Most of the highest sales prices came at the height of the market, the latter part of 2021, and the first two months of 2022. But there sure were some bargains to be had during the market crash. At the bottom of the market in 2011, I recall that a waterfront home in Saratoga Lakes sold for \$130,000! It was a bank-owned property on Naranja Ave.

As you know, not all people appreciate HOAs, but I find myself bragging about ours. I love the fact that we get so many amenities including three recreation centers with pools, eight lakes, fishing, a dog park, parks, playgrounds, walking paths, tennis, basketball and pickleball courts, a community **Xeriscape Garden**, a **Memorial Rose Garden** and so much more. The numerous events, clubs, and activities add to the value of our beautiful community. My wife and I have lived in our current home in Saratoga Lakes for over 30 years. My current house is my third residence in Dobson Ranch and it will be my last. We love it here!

The Dobson Home: Now a Beautiful Hospice

Anniversary CHEERS TO 50 YEARSI

Located in Chandler, at 1188 N. Dobson Road, the **Dobson Home** was first built in 1939 as the family residence and sheep farm of **Francis Roy** and **Pauline Dobson**, who had two children. The Dobson Home opened in 2004 with 11 patient private rooms and a nurse's station. It still has the look and feel of a family home and ranch, with ample grounds and a lovely patio.

The Dobson Home was originally constructed in 1939 on the corner of an alfalfa field. The owners, Francis Roy Dobson, his wife Pauline, and their two children **May** and **Roy**, moved into the house in 1940. At that time, the home consisted of three bedrooms, three bathrooms, a kitchen, family room and Francis Roy Dobson's office. The original property also had a garage with an apartment built over it. During the summer months, window fans kept the home cool.

There is a basement with several murals painted on the walls. **Barney Appleby**, Pauline's brother, was the artist. These scenes depict a sheep bridge, forest and sheep camp. Francis Roy Dobson grew hay, cotton and





barley on the land, but he mainly raised sheep. In the summer, the sheep were herded on foot to a sheep camp in northern Arizona and were herded back in the winter.

Since January 2003, Hospice of the Valley has leased the property from Jon and Susan Weeks. At that time, John Eden of Eden Architects LLC, was commissioned to draw plans to expand the Dobson Home. The expansion tripled the size of the original structure while preserving the original home. Mr. Eden received an Architectural Merit Award for his design.

Hospice of the Valley's Dobson Home opened as an inpatient care home in June of 2004. Hospice of the Valley's mission since our founding as a not-for-profit organization in 1977 is "bringing comfort, dignity and compassionate care to our community."

What makes the Dobson Home so special is the warm, cozy feeling you get as soon as you walk in the door and step into a lovely sitting room with a fireplace and adjoining dining room. There's alwayws something yummy cooking or baking -- and it truly does feel like coming home.

Tennis Club: Est. in the mid 70s - The Tennis Club was very active and would play on a weekly basis and even compete in local and state tournaments!

Women's Club: Revived in 1981, Est. in the 70s - In the fall of 1981, The Dobson Ranch Association recruited women on the Ranch to revive an inactive Women's Club.

Fae Keyes was one of the many who responded and held the first meeting in her home. This small group organized with devotion to the community as their platform. Officers were elected and Rosemarie Orlick emerged as President. Meetings were initially held in the members homes. Subsequently, La Casita became the regular meeting place. Annual scholarships have become the major philanthropic goal. The funds have been earned through a Christmas Boutique, two fashion Show Luncheons and Yard Sales, as well as successful Garage Sales. Other humanitarian efforts have become traditional.

Thanksgiving and Christmas packages are given to families

in need.

Retirees' Club: Est. 1998 - The Club was organized when several retired residents decided to meet and find ways to make new friends, stay active and become involved in Dobson Ranch activities together. From its inception, the Retirees' Club has fostered the spirit of good fellowship, volunteerism and social activities on Dobson Ranch. Each year the membership of the club has grown as Dobson Ranch residents enjoy the camaraderie and functions offered by club members. Some of the sub groups that branched off the include the Hiking Club, Cycling Club and several committees including Day Trippers, Dinner Night Out, Happy Hour, Men's Breakfast, Movie Day, Game Day, Ladies Lunch, and more.

Yacht Club: Est. in the early 2000's - The Dobson Ranch Yacht Club and annual Lighted Boat Parae was founded by Chris Diamond, Mike Rosenfeld, Manelle Williamson, Kevin McCarthy and Wes VerWoert. The club members also help to clean up the debris in the lakes of Dobson Ranch.

The Lakes of Dobson Ranch

Dobson Ranch, one of the largest master-planned communities in Arizona, is also one of the largest lake communities. Dobson Ranch is home to ten lakes that meander throughout the community, covering 78 acres. Whether enjoyed by strolling along a nearby path, relaxing in a boat, or fishing, the lakes are, and have been, a favorite amenity for residents of all ages throughout the years.

Canals

For an arid valley that receives less than 7" of rain a year, how did our community come to have lakes? To begin this story, we look at the ancient desert dwellers that lived in the region, years before European and American explorers arrived. The indigenous peoples built intricate canal systems by hand with stone tools that crossed nearly 500 miles along the Salt and Gila Rivers. This network of irrigation canals was the largest created in the early Americas.

Utilizing waters from the rivers, coupled with organized canal management, the ancestors of the **Akimel O'odham** built an empire that lasted nearly 1,500 years. Their farmland grew to cover over 27,000 acres until changing climatic conditions forced the canals to be abandoned around 1450. The canals could no longer be maintained due to repeated floods, coupled with drought. Visit **Mesa Grande Cultural Park** (1000 N. Date, Mesa 85201) for more history.

Our story continues in the 1800s with the influx of pioneer settlers to the area, now known as the Salt River Valley. The Dobson Family emigrated from Canada to Mesa during this time. These ranches and farming operations used water flowing in the original canals and established new ones. Please visit Mesa's Park of the Canals (1710 N. Horne, Mesa 85203) to see the historic canals. But just as the ancient desert dwellers had

experienced, the continued cycle of drought and flooding continued. A drought starting in 1898 was so intense, acres of farmland went out of production and people moved away. John Dobson, along with other remaining ranchers, came up with a solution - a water storage dam was needed to capture spring runoff of snowmelt from forested mountains in northern and eastern Arizona, which is now the Tonto National Forest.

In 1903, the group of ranchers founded the Salt River Valley Water Users' Association by pledging more than 200,000 acres of land as collateral. With this pledge, the Users' Association secured federal funds from the National Reclamation Act of 1902 to build a water storage and delivery system. These funds built the Roosevelt Dam, which was completed in 1911. Today, this project, the Salt River Project (SRP), delivers water and hydroelectric power to more than 2 million people in central Arizona, using a 131-mile canal system.



Continental Flomes

Continuing our story, in the 1970s the City of Mesa approved the sale of land from the Dobsons to Continental Homes.

The lakes of Dobson Ranch were created by excavating down to a depth of 10 to 16 feet to form ten basins. The lakes were linked together through an intricate underground piping system, gutters and scuppers, and to this day, as it was when first filled in 1975, the lakes are supplemented with water from SRP and stormwater runoff. Approximately 1,300 acre-feet of water is lost annually to evaporation and seepage. In the 1990s the state recognized Dobson Ranch's surface water rights and made allowances for the evaporation and leakage. To make up for the water loss, and to ensure the lakes are filled, Dobson Ranch purchases water annually from SRP.

Committee

the Water & Lake Management Committee has advised the Board of Directors on different aspects of managing the lakes,

different aspects of managing the lakes, water levels, and flow. The lakes are tested monthly, and stocked with different fish, with each species doing their job.

nniversa



Artificial habitat installations have been placed around stocking locations and throughout Lakes 1, 7 and 8. The habitats create areas for smaller fish to evade predators and to lay their eggs and naturally procreate. Also calling the lakes home are turtles, ducks, cormorants, and geese.

Conservation

One area the Water and Lake Management Committee has addressed throughout the years is developing programs to save water, both in the community's common areas and in residential use. The Committee has prepared a Drought Management Plan for the Dobson Association to enact with regards to the City of Mesa is in a Stage One "Water Watch".

Through various programs, Dobson Ranch is a community leader in conservation. One example of ranch-wide water savings is by "reverse irrigation," a plan where common areas are under-watered in the summer to help save water for overseeding in the winter. The Association used less than 1,500,000 gallons of water in 2021 from the previous year. The use of Smart Irrigation Controllers, the "Rain Bird" boxes in the common areas, help the Association save as well.

Today's Arizona elementary school students are taught the major industries that shaped early Arizona, known as the 5 Cs: Cactus, Cattle, Citrus, Climate and Copper. The lakes at Dobson Ranch have been shaped by their own Cs as well: Canals, Continental Homes, Committee and Conservation. With help from the ancient desert dwellers, pioneers, urban visionaries, and ongoing community support and guidance, the lakes of Dobson Ranch are a true urban masterpiece.

Sameera's husband had the idea to replace jarring speed bumps with flatter, more gradual speed humps in Mesa, AZ and Dobson Ranch, after being inspired by the streetscapes he saw in France. Adib brought this idea to Dennis Kavanaugh, who was a Councilmember at the time, and Dennis helped get the speed humps passed and were approved in 2011 as part of the Mesa Speed Hump Program.

Sameera also was a member of and the head of the **Election Committee** for 20 years. She did a fantastic job making sure that the Dobson Ranch community had timely, fair, and accurate elections for the Board of Directors. In recognition, long-time resident, **Frank Mizner**, and the Board of Directors, awarded Sameera with a **Dragonfly Award** in 2016.
